1 Introduction and background

1.1 Purpose of this document

- Inch Cape Offshore Limited (ICOL) is applying to East Lothian Council (ELC) for Planning Permission in Principle (PPP) under the Town and Country Planning (Scotland) Act 1997 (as amended) for the Onshore Substation, electricity cables and associated infrastructure, collectively referred to as the Onshore Transmission Works (OnTW), which is required to connect ICOL's Offshore Wind Farm to the National Electricity Transmission System (NETS). An Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Report has been submitted to ELC in support of this application.
- This document comprises the pre-application consultation (PAC) report in respect of the OnTW and has been prepared by ICOL to document the PAC process that has been undertaken to inform the OnTW.

1.2 Proposal of Application Notice

- Prior to the submission of any planning application for a national or major development, prospective applicants must first submit a Proposal of Application Notice (PAN) to the planning authority, in this case East Lothian Council (the Council), advising of the proposed application and seeking agreement on the scope of pre-application consultation proposed. A minimum period of 12 weeks must pass following submission of the PAN before a planning application can be submitted. During this 12 week period, the applicant must carry out statutory pre-application consultation in accordance with proposals to be set out in the PAN and agreed with the Council.
- A PAN was submitted to the Council on 12th May 2017. A copy of the PAN is included in Appendix A. A copy of the PAN was also submitted to Cockenzie and Port Seton Community Council, Prestonpans Community Council and Tranent and Elphinstone Community Council, in accordance with the statutory requirements. The PAN was also copied to the Coastal Regeneration Alliance and the Battle of Prestonpans Heritage Trust.
- The PAN proposed that two public events would be held in advance of the planning application submission, as detailed further below.
- ICOL has engaged in a wide-ranging community consultation as part of its pre-planning consultation for the wider onshore transmission works proposed to be located on and around the site of the former Cockenzie Power Station. The consultation events detailed below were arranged in order to engage public opinion and ensure members of the public were kept informed of the application for the Proposed Development (the Proposed Application). Below ICOL has outlined the communication tools that were used to engage with the public in the local community and the nature of the comments we received. At all times ICOL ensured that residents and anyone attending the public exhibition were aware of how the Proposed Development differed from its predecessor, consented in 2014 under Council reference 14/00456/PPM.

2 Public Consultation Events

2.1 Dates and Location

- 7 Two public consultation "drop-in" events were held at community centres near to the site of the Proposed Development (the Site). These were held on the following dates and times:
 - Prestonpans: Tuesday 6th June 2017, 3pm 8.00pm, Prestonpans Primary School, Preston Road, Prestonpans, EH32 9EN
 - Cockenzie & Port Seton: Tuesday 14th June 2017, 3.30pm 8.00pm, Port Seton Centre, South Seton Park, Port Seton, EH32 0BG
- The venues were chosen on the basis of their convenience to the local community. Both are well-established venues which are well-used by the public. The community drop-in events were also publicised in the local media.

2.2 Publicity for Public Consultation Events and Other Events

- 9 ICOL used a wide range of methods for engaging with the public. These included:
 - Prestonpans Community Council publicised the Prestonpans event on their Facebook site (see Appendix C).
 - Post-event attendance at the Prestonpans Community Council meeting on 13th June and, separately Cockenzie and Port Seton Community Council meeting on 5th June.
 Members of the public and the committee members were provided with a short update on the proposals and a Q&A session was held at each community council meeting.
 - Advert placed in the East Lothian Courier on 18th May 2017 to allow 4 weeks' notice ahead of the public consultation events
 - Press article placed in the East Lothian Courier and distributed to other media outlets
 - Direct correspondence delivered to 2200 households in the area
- A copy of the advert placed in the Statutory Notices section of the East Lothian Courier can be found in Appendix B. A press release was also issued (see Appendix D) in advance of the drop-ins.
- A letter drop to 2200 properties adjacent to or within sight of the Site was hand delivered by 2nd June. The area covered included the streets outlined below (within the areas marked in yellow on the map):




Figure 1: Properties that received letter drop

2.3 Event Collateral

- A leaflet (See Appendix E) was produced for the events, which included a clear map of the Proposed Development.
- Pop-up stands and maps were available at the venues to enable members of the public to clearly view the plans and understand the context of the proposals. Banners were displayed covering the topics listed in Table 1.1 below.

Staff from ICOL and from agencies, including Grayling, were present to facilitate the meetings. Grayling's role was to welcome members of the public to the event, encourage feedback and direct questions to appropriate ICOL staff. Staff from ICOL included project leads, who were on hand throughout the events to answer any questions. Savills, ICOL's planning consultants, were present to provide detailed planning information.

It should be noted that the plans of the Proposed Development shown at the consultation events and contained in the leaflet (see Appendix E) showed a slightly larger redline area than had been shown on the plan which accompanied the PAN (the "PAN Plan"). The Development Site which will be the subject of the Proposed Application will reflect the PAN Plan.

2.4 Attendance at the events

16 Attendance at the events was as follows:

Prestonpans (6th June): 16 attendees

• Port Seton & Cockenzie (14th June): 41 attendees

• Total attendees: 57

2.5 Feedback from the drop-in sessions

- All attendees at the events were given an opportunity to write comments in feedback forms that were then posted into a secure box. Attendees were also notified of other methods to make comments, including in writing or via email.
- Not all of the attendees provided comments. However, ICOL did receive a total of 12 comments (from the 57 attendees). A full list of all of the responses and attendees is provided in Appendix F.

- 19 Comments and feedback from the events was mixed. Below ICOL have included copies in full of all of the comments received from the events.
- 20 Positive comments included the following, though a number included caveats:
 - "A more acceptable proposal than the original."
 - "Looking at and talking to people about what you are going to do- looks like this will work for Prestonpans as long as you stick to what and where you are going to work from and will not move into the housing/buildings."
 - "Supportive in the main, with the proviso that: height kept to minimum for visual effect, environment not impacted to determent of wildlife, noise and traffic not increased, surrounding area landscaped, local jobs created."
 - "Having read all the information provided and discussed this with Richard, it all appears
 to be satisfactory. We live close to the site and were glad to hear the proposals won't
 create a lot of noise or impact our lifestyles too much. Our concerns are what is to
 happen to the remaining part of the site although we appreciate this is outwith your
 control."
 - "(neighbours) Pros: Thanks for giving us the opportunity to view the new plans; very pleased that this is no longer on the battlefield site; happy with scale/height at 14 m and plans to landscape/camouflage; delighted that the main road will be unaffected. Cons: only creating two jobs locally in the long term; impact to harbour communities/jobs due to dredging flow of traffic down East Lorimer Place during"
 - "Very pleased to see the site moved to the old power station site rather than the green fields/Battlefield to the South. Might need or benefit from some imaginative landscaping or 'architecture'? Thank you."
- 21 However, a number of more negative comments were received:
 - "I would wish the site/buildings to be as unobtrusive as possible. Landscaping & screening would be very important e.g native trees, plants art work etc.). I would hope there might be some financial payback to the community. I worry that even though Inchcape might listen to the community comments their very existence on that site will encourage other more intrusive construction & industry."
 - "Do not want industry that doesn't yield jobs for the local area. If you receive planning permission I would like building and trees to screen the site effectively- especially from the road. Ideally, the coal store area would have been a good site, but avoiding the waggonway."
 - "I would rather the coal store be used. The coastline is a very attractive area and it would be a pity to spoil it. I realise wind energy is important but so is the attraction of Cockenzie and Port Seton for tourists. We have had one eyesore for many years, please don't give us a second."

2.6 Responding to concerns

- In relation to concerns about making the Proposed Development as unobtrusive as possible, ICOL have embedded mitigation measures through the earth bunding and proposed landscaping. ICOL is committed to ensuring that the substation is concealed as far as practicable from public view through suitable landscaping.
- Concerns were also expressed that the Proposed Development could prevent access to the pier and reduce the potential of the area for a cruise liner berth. The red line area demonstrates the total area required and ICOL have made it clear that the substation can be located in such a position within the red line area as to not obstruct the development of adjacent sites for leisure or tourist related activities.

2.7 Responding to the Previous Consultation

The previous consultation had taken place in January 2017 in Port Seton and Prestonpans and had provided members of the public to respond to the proposals for the development of the site shown below.





Figure 2: OnTW site proposed at previous consultation

In response to the proposals, a number of the public expressed concerns that the proposed site would impact on the historic battlefield site and compromise the setting of the historic wagon way. A number of comments were made at the drop-ins by local residents that they would prefer to see the site relocated to a new location away from the battlefield site and closer to the coast. Comments at the events included "Can't support plans, why not see SP to give you an alternative to a battlefield?"; "The battlefield is our heritage site and our community deserve a right to keep it." and "Wrong site. Should not be here because of Battlefield & housing on each side of the site." This view was reinforced by one of the written submissions from a resident that stated they were opposed "to building transmission works on battle site" — it should be "built to the north, on brownfield land". The new application addresses these concerns by ensuring the Proposed Development is removed from the battlefield land and the wagon way.

3 Conclusion

- The PAC has performed a variety of functions, including:
 - Providing information to the local community on the developing proposals and an opportunity to ask for their views, issues, concerns or comments on the proposals at an early stage;
 - Helping to create a dialogue with the local community and interested parties with the aim of helping to clear the concerns of some members of the local community;
 - Providing the community with an opportunity to meet the project team and to ask the team questions, for further information and to arrange for other meetings; and
 - Providing the community with a chance to find out how to contribute comments and or information related to the proposals.
- The PAC has complied with or exceeded the minimum statutory requirements.
- The project team is committed to continuing dialogue with the public and other consultees through the next stages of development of the proposals.





Public to get look at substation plans at Cockenzie

PLANS to relocate a proposed electrical substation from a controversial site to part of the former Cockenzie Power Station go on public display as people are invited to take part in two community consultations.

Inch Cape Offshore Limited (ICOL) holds the first public exhibition of

its plans on Tuesday in Prestonpans, with a further event in Cockenzie and Port Seton the following week. ICOL had applied for, and been

ICOL had applied for, and been granted, planning approval to build the substation on land at the old Coal Store, despite objection from the Battle of Prestonpans Heritage Trust. But it was revealed that the company, which is planning to bring in energy from an offshore windfarm at the site, was now looking at putting the substation on the old power station site itself.

The company said the decision came after feedback from consulta-

tion on the original plans, along with the opportunity created by the decommissioning of the power station.

The first public consultation is in Prestonpans Primary School on Tuesday, 3.30-8pm, with the second at Port Seton Centre next Wednesday (June 14), 3-8pm.

Background

ICOL was initially granted planning permission in principle by East Lothian Council in September 2014 for onshore transmission works between Prestonpans and Cockenzie, which it intends to renew with a new application this summer.


The purpose of the planning application is to seek permission to develop the onshore transmission works. The consultation event was held to ensure the community is informed and given the opportunity to contribute views which will be included as part of the planning application submitted to East Lothian Council.

Once the final details of the onshore transmission works are known, ICOL will go through a further application process with East Lothian Council for detailed planning permission.

ICOL Onshore Transmission Works

In recognition of feedback from community engagement events ICOL is promoting a change in location for the onshore works and is taking forward a new planning application for this to be located on the site of the former Cockenzie Power Station.

The onshore transmission works includes an onshore substation, electricity cables and associated infrastructure required for the transmission of electricity from the proposed offshore wind farm. A grid connection is required at a location onshore to link the offshore wind farm to the National Electricity Transmission System. ICOL accepted a connection from National Grid Electricity Transmission in January 2012, with a connection point at the existing substation at Cockenzie. The site for the proposed onshore transmission works development is represented in the map below.


